



Discerning God's Direction blog post by Aaron Glenn, June 23, 2015

"Be flexible."

It is uncanny how that little statement almost always defines what we call mission trips, and it is no different this time as we get to know people on the Ute Mountain Ute Indian Reservation.

As a reminder, about eighty people from UBC are staying in a hotel at Towaoc (pronounced Toy-ah-K), Colorado, on the reservation. The majority of us are commuting forty-five minutes south to a build-site on Navajo territory, and things seem to be going well down there despite some very intense heat, breaking one hundred degrees. (I plan to visit all of them on that work site today and can blog a more detailed report after doing so.)

When I say pastors, picture strong, wise and hardworking women. Most of these are also grandmothers all working bi-vocationally, some helping to raise grandchildren. There are also a few men, who are wise in their own right and with life experience among the group, but out here, the women are the driving force in the churches and they have blessed us!

As we planned this time over the past few months, it was decided early on that UBC would participate, but not lead. This is our time to listen, learn and respond to the prompting of the Holy Spirit to pray.

Until this point, I have been among the dozen others of our UBC folks who have been engaging on the Ute Reservation in an attempt to get to know our host community and to discern God's direction for us in this region... Simply put, it has been amazing!

For the past two evenings, we have met with Ute pastors and some of their family members for a time of sharing and prayer. Although ecumenical, we start each evening at 6 pm in the Baptist way—with a potluck! (I especially like that part.) There is no substitute for table fellowship with others in order to bring down the defenses.

Well, our time with the Ute and the Navajo has come to a close. Many of us will leave at 4 am tomorrow (Friday) morning to head back to Texas, while others will take their time with an extra day or two for sight-seeing.

We had a nice service at the build-site this evening with the traditional "key ceremony"-handing over the keys of the new building to the pastor and other church leaders. Testimonies were shared and there was a great feeling of camaraderie amongst everyone who had worked so hard all week on the building project, cooking team, VBS and others. Each team gave a brief report to the group and it seemed that everyone was pleased with the results of their efforts. There is no denying that our UBC volunteers feel a strong passion for the work they do and for their specific sense of calling to this work. It was fun to interact with each other in this beautiful environment while celebrating a job well done!

On the Ute side of things, we wrapped up basketball camp on a positive note. After the first day (Monday) we learned a little better how to relate to some of the harder-to-reach kids. We tried our best to give positive reinforcement and to speak words of affirmation and care to the children. At the end of the camp, we gave each child a basketball and we placed Bibles on a table that were an "optional" gift if they wanted one. We were happy to see every Bible taken from the table and pray that God will be faithful to show these children that they are beloved by Him.

We continued to meet each evening with the group of Ute pastors and lay people for times of sharing, singing and praying. Each night we went from 6-10:30 pm, and we are leaving with a sense of friendship and respect for these

brothers and sisters in Christ. We gained a little insight into life on the reservation and to the unique ways God is speaking and directing leaders in this cultural context. There are many ways we (as UBC) could overlap with the Ute Mountain Ute tribe in the future, so we pray for God's direction in this area. We have open doors among the tribal leaders and also now have some budding relationships with church leaders. The Ute Mountain Ute tribe has just over two-thousand members living on the reservation, which is the size of UBC's membership! There are many ways our tribe and the Ute tribe can learn and help one another.





Anchor Point

Helping "Anchor" Hope

Anchor Point, a non-profit ministry in the Clear Lake area, works through a variety of programs to deliver hope to families, including pregnant teens and women, babies on the way, troubled youth and their families, foster and adopted children, and families considering adoption. Turning their words "No one is beyond hope" into action, Anchor Point recently chose UBC as the host location to help educate and empower these families.

During the last week of July, fifteen children and their families met with special volunteers to participate in the Pathway to Hope Family Camp, held at UBC. While the camp (in its second year) is designed to be fun, it also provides tools for families to thrive together. An alternative to medical and cognitive-behavioral therapies, the camp models an approach used by Dr. Karyn Purvis and the Institute of Child Development at Texas Christian University, helping families feel empowered, connected and corrected in life values.

For five days, the upstairs classrooms were full of interactive toys, and part of the Fellowship Hall was repurposed as a soft agility course. With motivationally phrased posters everywhere, volunteers worked closely with their young "buddies" throughout UBC's facilities in empowerment exercises involving safety, safe touch, nutrition, sensory processing and self-regulation. Parents or guardians received their own individualized education and training sessions, and each day in the afternoon, the families would reunite and connect through attachment, engagement strategies and playful interaction.

Debbie Simmons, the camp's executive director, seemed a perfect fit to lead something of such value to local families. Besides Master's degrees in several areas including Education and Seminary, she is compassionately familiar with common struggles many adoptive families face. Married and with nine adopted children of their own, she and her husband offer a wealth of experience and knowledge very beneficial to the program. When asked her thoughts about the camp, Debbie beamed, "Through our amazing volunteers, we are giving hope. Families are walking away with hope!"

Her embracing and comforting teaching style was apparent as she sat on a table in the Fellowship Hall for a connected eye-to-eye interview, and then lowered to her knees as she lightly beckoned a five-year old child over for an impromptu interview. After talking with him about "focusing and finishing" and reaffirming the fun he'd had, and the love he had received, she finished with several big hugs and then called all the children from breakfast. Squeals of excitement arose as the kids lined up with their volunteers and shaving cream to venture outside for a much-anticipated "face shaving" event.

The goals of this camp were to help families and children construct meaningful connections, form deeper relationships, and to thrive in life, Anchor Point follows up with the progress made at the camp through a scheduled "post-camp day" and also with "in-home" groups. Helping Trafficked Survivors Take Flight

Sometimes, mission efforts can center on complicated or delicate issues. Lack of awareness can lead to misconception or even dismissal. It is in these situations that awareness and education are important first steps. Such is the case with the elusive issues of human labor and sex trafficking.

"Human trafficking can affect anyone regardless of class, education, gender or age. It occurs when someone is forcefully coerced or lured by false promises," explained John Gowan, Director of Development for Redeemed Ministries, a faith-based, non-profit organization that focuses on rehabilitating adult women victims after involvement in domestic (local) sex trafficking.

According to the 2014 Annual Report from the National Human Trafficking Resource Center, Texas has the second highest call volume from all fifty states. With its high volume of illicit massage parlors, strip clubs, back-page advertising, cantinas and truck stops, Houston is considered a high probability location for sex trafficking.

"Not only does sex trafficking involve U.S. citizens in the U.S., but it also occurs right here in Texas, and in the Houston area," said John.

Survivors are often left with emotional scars, lack of security and little resources for their new life. This is where Redeemed steps in: to address the survivors' needs and provide care in a variety of ways.

Redeemed operates a four-bed safe house (the only known safe

house of its kind in Texas) for holistic healing. Survivors receive a structured schedule to address the chaos caused by the trauma, and third-party, trauma-trained counselors develop individualized care for a healthy reintegration to independent living.

Currently, Redeemed provides ongoing services to over thirty female survivors of adult domestic sex trafficking through multiple local, state and federal law enforcement agencies and other anti-trafficking organizations.

Engaging the community and volunteers with a variety of denominational backgrounds, Redeemed believes "everything needed for survivor care is sitting in the pews of our churches."

Redeemed Ministries holds regular information sessions, and provides opportunities to volunteer. For more information, visit ubc.org or their website at redeemedministries.com.

Facilities Update

Recreation & Mission Center

Hopefully you have noticed the work on the Mission Center during the last several weeks. We are nearing completion of Phase 1 to "dry in" the building. This includes the addition of the brick, building the front facade, erecting the columns between the doors, installing all the doors and windows, and completing the building electrical.

Additional funding has been provided for Phase 2. It includes the parking lot, parking lot lighting, drainage, and a new detention area along the back fence.

Phase 3 will be the training rooms and bathrooms; its funding is anticipated with resolution of the architect's estate.

Work on the Pavilion has also resumed. Phase 1 completes the brick columns, the flat roof and trim, and priming of the steel beams. Phase 2 will complete the metal roof, the bathrooms, electrical, plumbing and

walkways. Funding for Phase 2 is also anticipated with resolution of the architect's estate.

Efforts to recover funds from the former architect's estate is progressing, so continue to pray for a favorable outcome.







Future Projects (Pending Design and Funding)

- Additional parking will provide seventy additional spots (including handicap and senior adult parking in closer proximity to the Worship Center)
- Explortation of possible solutions for foyer modifications, which could dramatically improve transition flow between services
- Eventual addition of a Welcome Center around the current pastoral suite, extending to the parking lot
- Consideration of an amphitheater to enhance the Pavilion
- Chapel expansion, which could provide a performance-type venue for the community as well as a more suitable environment for the contemporary worship service
- Remodel of the student space on the third floor of the Learning Center





Did You Know?

The 130-ton AC chiller for the Learning Center is the original equipment. We have nursed it along for several years, but it is time to finally say goodbye to the old friend.

The new chiller will arrive mid to late October at a price of about \$111,000. Current plans are to use year end cash flow to cover the expense.

Thanks for your faithful stewardship. It keeps our children comfortable.

Beach Retreat

With my experience as a camper and now as a leader, the experiences were absolutely incredible. Just having finished Silvercliff (the student ministry high school camp), I didn't expect to hear anything in the Impact sermons that was new to me or deep, but I did take something away from each and every one of them. This, I felt, really affected how I taught the lessons in my small group. It definitely allowed me to be able to challenge the kids with questions when the time was right, which eventually got us into conversations about the lesson.

It was during this time that it was really revealed to me how malleable these kids are and how important it is to be a great role model. The majority of the leadership outside of the small group times involved a strong lead-by-example approach. Sometimes that meant you just had to go completely nuts in recreation, dig in really deep in a prayer time during the sermon, or just throw yourself all into worship. My overall experience at Impact camp 2015 was unforgettable and, if invited again, I would definitely make a point to clear my schedule to make it.

Silvercliff

There are no words to describe the way God moves in our students during camp. There is something about being nestled at the base of a mountain that reminds you how small you are and how much God loves you. Our speaker from last year, Brian Rayburn, returned and blew us away with his teaching. He challenged us with the truth that the life of a disciple should be characterized by empathy and suffering.



If we are truly following Christ, then we should care deeply about those in the world around us with a consuming love. If we truly love others, then we are giving all we have to serve them. It was a challenging idea which wove its way through all of our conversations that week.

The students talked about not only big changes they could make, but small ways in their daily lives that they could serve God by serving others, listening to others and loving people with abandon. It was amazing.

As always, there was plenty of fun and leisure activities too. We played volleyball, basketball, indoor soccer, ping pong, had a belly flop contest and went rafting. There was even a group who spent time lounging in the grass and in hammocks talking about life and God. There is no place on earth like Silvercliff Ranch.





This past July, I had the incredible opportunity to be a part of the Love Africa team to Port Shepstone, South Africa. My daughter, Rachel, had gone to Port Shepstone the year before and desperately wanted to return, so I decided to go with her. Once my deposit was paid, fear and anxiety over the trip consumed me. How will I be able to handle being on a flight for sixteen plus hours? What am I thinking going to a foreign country in Africa? Will my family be all right while I am away? What if there is an emergency? How can God possibly use me for mission work? The doubts and worry kept playing in my mind over and over. Two days before I was to depart, there was a family emergency and I prayed about not going on the trip. Thankfully, God cleared the way for me to get on the flight and travel to now my beloved country, South Africa.

The Love Africa group worked with the Genesis Trust organization in Port Shepstone. Our primary mission field was at a local high school (Nobamba) teaching life skills to ninth grade students. At the beginning of the week, the girls and I were apprehensive and guarded with each other, but after my co-leader and I started sharing and teaching the girls, the tension and uncertainty disappeared. My pronunciation of their names and other Zulu words created lots of laughter. Throughout the week we discussed self-esteem, what love is, God's view on marriage, and HIV prevention. As the discussions became more personal, the girls opened up more. When Friday came, it was hard to say good-bye. All of us had grown so much in the week and the Lord had given us all such a sweet relationship. These girls remain in my thoughts and prayers today.

Every afternoon, the team would visit an after-school program in the Murchison area. The main purpose of our group at this ministry was for us to play with and love on these children, as there are so many children and so few staff that they are starved for love.

Watching the youth from UBC interact with these children completely warmed my heart. There is no language barrier when it comes to playing and loving children. God showed me that my mission there was simply to help the amazing women that work at Murchison by giving them a much-needed break. Some of the youth and I would prepare and serve the protein meal replacement porridge to the children. Most days we served over 125 children, and for a majority of these children, this was the only meal they received all day. Then I would wash and put away all of the cups, bowls and silverware. I only did this for a week. The women at Murchison staff do it every single day, week, month and year. I was in awe of these women. Each of them radiate the love of Christ to these children. Tirelessly, they give a kind word, needed correction or a loving hug. The children that go to Murchison after school are blessed to be in the presence of these Godly women.



The Genesis Trust organization also has a care center for patients who are dying of HIV. One afternoon, I had the opportunity to tour the humble facility. The people that work at the care center are angels on this earth. The patients are treated with such tenderness and compassion. The facility is cheerful, clean and warm. My mother was in a nursing home in League City for the last nine months of her life and how I wish she could have be cared for in a place like this. The patients who are spending their last days on earth are blessed with the face of Jesus reflected by the precious nursing staff.

I spent ten days in Port Shepstone, South Africa and I will never be the same. The struggles in this area are many: unemployment, poor education, poverty, HIV/ AIDS, TB, strong racial divides, and a young population. But there is a joy in the people of South Africa that I have never seen before. This joy radiates through Nobamba, Murchison and the care center. This joy rings loud and clear in the songs the students sing every morning. This joy comes across with every smile on the children's faces. This joy is passed on to others through every hug. The people in South Africa know how to love unconditionally. Because of their love for me, I am truly changed and a piece of my heart remains with them. I can't wait to go back, and for you to join me.



The University Baptist Church Team from Texas, visited the Care Centre recently. Pastor Kyle Wilson brought with him an emphatic and energetic message from Hebrews that blessed and encouraged everyone that heard it. Reverend Mashiyane, Pastor Dumisane, Pastor Kyle, our patients and staff joined in a time of worship that made this visit a deeply meaningful time for everyone.

Second Annual 5K Run for Rand

At UBC on Saturday, May 16, UBCers and other community members participated in the second annual RUN for RAND—a 5K fun run/walk promoting an active lifestyle to fight poverty and AIDS in South Africa. (Rand is South African currency). Over 190 people showed to support the 5K run.

The idea of the 5K Run started when Rachel Halloran returned from South Africa in the summer of 2013 with the UBC Love Africa Team. While there, each of the team members were challenged to look for ways to make a difference and help the people living around Port Shepstone, one of the most infected HIV/AIDS areas of South Africa.

"I realized that, after school, most kids don't have anything to do. I was also really surprised to find that they had no organized sports in the schools. Being an athlete, this inspired me to start a running program where kids can go after school and train with each other," shared Rachel.

Several thousand dollars was raised for Genesis Ministry in Port Shepstone. The UBC Love Africa Team took the donated running shoes and funds to Africa in July.



After much determination, coordination and help from church members and the community, Rachel's God-inspired vision came true.

Chorus Kids

Spring is always filled with the excitement of preparing our children's musical. This year was no different.

Our kids worked diligently at memorizing lines, learning music and motions, and participating in "extra" rehearsals as they prepared for the musical, Back to the Cross.

The first of May was a big day for Chorus Kids. We started off the day leading in worship with one of the songs from our musical. First through fifth choirs sang in the 9:30 a.m. worship service. That night, approximately sixty kids presented Back to the Cross.

We joined Norman and a cast of characters as they embarked on a time-traveled excursion relying on the questionable reliability of the H/O-2000 Temporal Displacement Modulator (otherwise known as the Time Travel Machine), all the while discovering the importance of the Cross and the message of the Gospel.

Following the musical, children who participated in the Hymns for Memory program received a medal for memorizing three, five or seven hymns. We had seventeen gold medal recipients, seven silver medal recipients, and ten bronze medal recipients. That's a total of thirty-four kids memorizing hymns!

The Chorus Kids ministry is blessed with an amazing group of leaders who have hearts for teaching kids about God's love for us through music. This spring, we had four choir directors, six choir teachers, a choreography director and a drama director. Our ministry goal is to help children become lifelong worshipers of God as they grow in their relationship with Him.

Family DR Trip

God is doing amazing things in the Dominican Republic. And our family mission team of ten kids and ten adults was blessed to be part of His work there.


We had the opportunity to continue partnering with Raquel's School. In 2014, the mission team built a playground there and cleaned out the school. This year, the team was tasked with building 40 desks to be used in new second story (currently under construction at the school). Reviewing the progress after the first day of work and completing all the desks over the next two days seemed near impossible. But, there is a verse painted on the wall of Raquel's School and in the dining hall at the church: "Porque Nada Hoy Imposible Para Dios...Nothing is Impossible with God." (Luke 1:37). And God would once again show us this truth. By the end of day three, not only were the 40 desks completed, but an additional 22 were also done—62 desks in all!

In addition to building the desks, we helped with VBS. And God continued to show Himself as He turned the impossible into the possible. There was rain, heat, humidity, small spaces and more children than seemed practical. But God was able to work through His people to accomplish His work. The kids enjoyed Bible teaching, crafts, music, recreation and skits. And we enjoyed loving on the kids and experiencing how God can help us be creative and flexible to handle impossible situations.

Our trip also included time to play with children at orphanages, have dinner in the homes of Dominican church members and worship with our Dominican friends on Sunday morning. During sharing time on the last night, one of the younger children spoke, "When things are hard, and you go ahead and do it, that's when it's fun. It's really fun!"

There is nothing like a mission trip to push you beyond your limits, beyond your comfort zone and beyond the possible. Join us next summer as we return to the Dominican Republic to join God in His work there.





UBC Holds First Science Camp

Kids (completed grades 1-5) were having a "blast" everywhere this summer during the week of July 20–23 as UBC hosted its first science camp for kids. Aptly named Kamp Kaboom, this four day camp entertained and transformed almost one hundred children into inquiring, imaginative scientists!

Robin Mayeaux directed the camp with the help of twenty-two teenagers and seven adults. The goals were to conduct scientific investigations and experiments, walk through the BASIC elements of faith (Believe, Ask, Serve, Impact, Celebrate) and just have fun! When Associate Pastor of Children's Ministries Karen Murphy was asked about the overall success of the camp, she affirmed definitively, "GRAND. SLAM."

Starting at 8:30 each morning, the children would have worship and a skit to set the stage for the day. During the day, they would do several science experiments, work together in small groups, and then present their own science project. The fun would continue in the afternoons as the children became investigating adventurers on field trips to places like NASA Johnson Space Center, Houston's Health Science Museum and the Museum of Natural Science.

The last day of camp was celebrated with inflatable slides, and how else? Playing in slime!

- "I loved seeing their faces light up as they saw different reactions during the experiments..." (volunteer)
- "This [camp] is a perfect setting for me to express my love for kids and spread the word of Jesus..." (volunteer)

Amidst all the scheduled activities, something unexpected and remarkable happened according to Karen, who explained:



A twelve-year old autistic child wrote an absolutely beautiful letter about his experience in the camp and what it meant to him. His father was amazed not only by the letter, but also his son's transformation. He emphasized that UBC was the most welcoming church they'd ever attended, and asserted that UBC would be their new church home. We are so happy God used this camp experience to positively change this family.

CentriKid Camp

On Monday morning, July 27, fifty children (completed grades 3–5) and eleven adults loaded a chartered bus and headed north to Trinity Pines Baptist Encampment for a week of preteen camp!

This was UBC's first year to participate in CentriKid. From the future sports star to the young scientist to the rising chef, children had the opportunity to participate in exciting activities of their choice. Each day, they also took part in Bible study, recreation, track times and worship.

The theme for the week was FIT (Faith in Training). Our kids learned about the spiritual practices that help them grow in their faith. They had opportunities to internalize God's word and allow Him to be their teacher, and they were provided with some practical, take-it-home tools for using spiritual practices as they grow their faith. Throughout the week, they were challenged to "be a disciple"—a follower of Jesus Christ.

One of the favorite events of the week was OMC (Organized Mass Chaos), and that it was! Imagine seven hundred kids running toward each other outdoors to spray, dump and squirt everything from shaving cream to silly string—it was messy! But they loved it! After the commotion and everyone was filthy, the camp staff pulled the kids in and talked to them. They talked about sin, how sin is messy, and our need for our Savior.

The kids got to "wear" the lesson, and then invited Christ to make them clean (as they were hosed off with water). Like this example, the children got to physically experience all the "teaching" that went on at the camp. As one of our kids appreciatively articulated, "I loved camp, but there was just a lot of learning."



College and seminary students who staffed the camp hung out with our kids and shared Christ through every aspect of camp! This connection was appreciated as it allowed our leaders a special time each morning for spiritual renewal and refreshment.

UBC is returning to CentriKid again next year! Our dates have been set for August 1–5, 2016—same place!

Kamp Kindness

UBC Kids Relish In Random Acts of Kindness

For three days this summer, kids from Kamp Kindness were in "full-service" mode at UBC! Kamp Kindness, a mission-based day camp, is for kids who have completed grades 2–5 and who regularly attend UBC's groups/classes. Along with volunteers, twenty children participated in the camp performing random acts of kindness.

On Monday, they visited to the Houston Food Bank and prepared boxes of food. They sorted, weighed and boxed 6,389 pounds of food in three and half hours, equating to 5,324 meals! Children commented with passion that they loved learning about the distribution process at the food bank and being part of this important service.


The next day, the kids served along Lighthouse Christian Ministries in Baycliff distributing food to recipients at Bayshore Spillway Park. Serving people, seeing their smiles, and hearing them say "Thank you" and "Bless you" really made the children feel special and grateful.





On the last day (Wednesday), the young missionaries baked cookies and potted plants to deliver to some of UBC's shut-ins. They also hosted a birthday party for one of their senior adults who had no family with whom to celebrate.

As valuable life lessons were abound that week, the children all had good things to say about their experiences with Kamp Kindness. Perhaps one young camper summarized the experience best when she learned how important her role is in helping others, saying, "I learned that God can use kids to help people." And indeed, God does!





In the second week of June, something of great magnitude took shape in the Worship Center. You may have noticed a chill in the air as the rugged terrain and monumental size of a backdrop took the shape of earth's highest summit above sea level. The great symbol of trial and triumph, Mount Everest, was the focal graphic of this year's VBS theme—Everest: Conquering Challenges with God's Mighty Power. And it was quite a triumph!

An amazing 795 children registered for the weeklong event, with the remarkable help of over 250 volunteers. The week's activities were part of an icy expedition where kids were taught rocksolid Bible truths to guide them through life's challenges and overcome obstacles.



During the week, VBS was a safe place for kids to talk about questions they had about God. As opportunities arose to discuss life's challenges or share God's love in a unique way, children discovered God has the power to provide, comfort, heal, forgive and love us forever, and that God's awesome power is enough to overcome any "mountain" or problem in our lives. The children experienced this lesson first hand as potential area flooding required Tuesday's VBS to be cancelled. Even with the small change in our scheduling, we were still amazed to watch God at work! This year's VBS mission focus was on the Dominican Republic, a place where UBC has an established mission field and where the Family Mission Trip was scheduled to occur just a few weeks after the conclusion of VBS.

To engage the children attending VBS with this project, we introduced children from our congregation who had already been to the Dominican Republic. We also introduced children who were headed to there to build the very things for which we raised money in VBS! Our VBS preschoolers raised money to buy drills, and our VBS children (Kindergarten through 5th grade) raised enough money to build sixty desks for the Dominican school in which we worked in last summer while providing ministry!

The accomplishments of VBS could not have happened without the scores of volunteers who spent months preparing, and who stepped up each day during VBS week. Some volunteers came all week; some came for a day or two. But they all had an impact on God's Kingdom.

I am in awe of how God works...and how His plans are so much bigger than mine. From the number of children with whom we had the opportunity to minister, to the tremendous amount of pennies and nickels the children were able to raise for other children in need, I am truly humbled by what God can do, if we follow His lead.

The initial phase of construction will soon begin with selection of a new construction firm.

There is great value in creating a safe, fun and welcoming environment for our children—a place where kids love coming to church and can't wait to come back.

Our plan is to renovate the children's space and renew the Children's Ministry identity by becoming **UBC Kids in FLIGHT** (Kids Faithfully Living In God's Holy Truth).

As we create this new Children's Ministry area, we are asking you to "join the journey," inviting children to join in the spiritual journey of belonging, preparing and serving, helping them envision how they can serve in their community and around the world and inspiring them to reach their full potential in Christ.

THE NEW SPACE

When people step into the Children's Ministry area, they will know that kids are important at UBC! The welcome area will be open, fun and inviting. Parents will feel confident that their children will be safe and well cared for during their time with us.

As they walk to the classrooms, they will see the values of UBC. One hallway will be transformed to remind kids of the important faith skills that are part of their journey in Children's Ministry: learning to navigate the Bible, memorizing scripture, praying, sharing their faith and worshiping God with their life.

The other hallway will encourage kids to find their place of service by highlighting the mission opportunities at UBC.

The Great Room will be an exciting and fun place for large group worship and activities.

The new space will be ideal for all the Children's Ministry activities: WBS, Bible Blast, Bible Drill, Children's Choir, GAs and RAs. And, it will allow us to continue to reach out to the community to provide a meeting place for organizations such as Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Reach Co-op.

THE PLAN

Planned Improvements:

- Update and enlarge the check-in area to provide a welcoming experience for members and guests
- Reconfigure bathrooms moving the entrance out of the "public traffic" area to improve safety
- Install new signage to direct parents to rooms
- Modify rooms to maximize space
- Paint hallways to inspire kids in the areas of belonging, preparing, serving
- Update lighting and sound in the Great Room to accommodate children's large group worship time and activities

THE PROPOSAL

To transform the children's area into a welcoming, safe and fun environment for kids requires funding of \$300,000.

The improvements will be completed in three planned phases (as funding is available):

Phase 1: Remodel bathrooms and welcome area

Phase 2: Modify classrooms and hallways

Phase 3: Update Great Room

Preschool Ministries KJOY

Each day at KJOY (July 22–25), UBC kindergartners made or constructed an item they knew they would eventually give to someone else. This was just a small act our KJOY campers did that helped them remember what this camp was all about-<u>K</u>indergarteners learning to serve <u>J</u>esus first, <u>O</u>thers second, and <u>Y</u>ourself last. The items they made always included Jesus within them. They placed Bible verse stickers on the cans of food to be donated to Clear Lake Food Pantry. They decorated bags with Christian messages and filled them with food, water and a personal written prayer for the homeless. Most of all, everything the children did was filled with the love of Jesus.

The kids were able to see and interact with the people they were helping. They served food to the homeless men and women at the Mercy Tree. The residents of Brookdale Assisted Living engaged in conversations with our kids while painting ceramics. They shared gifts for babies and the staff and volunteers of Anchor Point Pregnancy and Childbirth Service. They prayed with our pastors at UBC.

The children could clearly see how their selfless acts were helping and affecting others. This aided in planting in the students' minds that when they donate food or toys, or give a homeless person some food, it is truly helping those people and making God smile down on their good deeds.

This program enabled the kindergartners to learn why we need to help those who are less fortunate than us by placing them in areas where they can safely experience the acts that God wants us to perform. It helped progress their understanding of the true meaning of community service and how everything we do should be done for Jesus and others before ourselves.

The effects of this program are still impacting others. One of the men whom we fed our first day at the Mercy Tree started frequenting my place of work the next day. I now see this kind and caring man at least twice a month, and he seizes opportunities to help others. He will come in and buy food (with his own scarce money) for people whom he knows cannot go to a store to buy any for themselves.

I know that it was God's will for Patrick to start coming to my place of employment the following day to help remind me, and remind others, that what we can do for strangers, even if it is just a little, can greatly affect all of our lives. With God's blessings, even small acts of selflessness can grow to something bigger.

Through the Lord's provisions, we have consolidated our ministries to preschool, elementary, middle school, and high school students into the Learning Center, as well as completing the remodel of our adult meeting spaces. We started raising funds for our children's area remodel, are working through the sudden passing of our architect and contractor, are completing our Mission Training Center, and moving ahead on our gift to the community, the Pavilion.

It is with great expectation of what God will continue to do that the Executive Council recommends the FY 2016 Budget. The staff anticipates that the ministry plans for 2016 requires two percent additional funding. The Executive Council endorses the requested increase, recognizing that UBC's practice is to live within the funding the Lord provides through the obedience of His people.

Please be in prayer for good stewardship as well as the plans God has for us.


